Workforce Strengths


Camrose is home to two established post-secondary institutions: the University of Alberta Augustana Campus (Augustana) and Canadian Lutheran Bible Institute (CLBI). Augustana is a small liberal arts and sciences campus, focused on educating the whole person. They offer 13 programs covering 22 disciplines, creating a talent pipeline where students understand the value of living and working in rural communities. CLBI is a small Bible school with a 2-year diploma program with internship opportunities. Around 300 young people graduate from these two institutions with Diplomas, Bachelor of Arts, and Bachelor of Science degrees, eager to enter the workforce.



Where We Are

Alberta is positioned between the provinces of British Columbia and Saskatchewan. Alberta is directly North of Montana, USA.

Within Alberta, Camrose is centrally located with excellent connection to major rail and road transportation networks.



Location & Transportation

Camrose is a friendly community located at the heart of some of the most productive agricultural land in the province¹. The City of Camrose is surrounded by 625,000 acres of farmland in the county and within 3 hours of 70% of Alberta's population.



Highway Transportation

Camrose is located in East Central Alberta within Camrose County, 95km southeast of the provincial capital city, Edmonton.

The City of Camrose is positioned along Highway 13, Highway 26, and Highway 833.

Air Service Camrose Municipal Airport has a 1,375m runway with several taxiways, a 24-hour air terminal, and fuel.

YEG (Edmonton International Airport) is located 74 km from Camrose. This airport serves 8.2 million passengers per year and offers non-stop service to 50 destinations around the world².

YYC (Calgary International Airport) is located 275 km from Camrose. This airport serves 18.5 million passengers per year and offers non-stop service to 95 destinations in 19 countries³.

Rail Service

Camrose is serviced by both major railway companies with interchange capability between them.

Canadian National Railway (CN) runs north/south with primary connection points being Edmonton and Calgary. CN tracks feed directly into the Calgary CN

Hub.

Canadian Pacific Railway (CPKC) runs east/west through Camrose with connections to Edmonton and Calgary via Wetaskiwin. CPKC tracks feed directly into the Edmonton CPKC Hub. This rail line also branches west to the Saskatchewan border¹.

Battle River Railway (BRR) is a new generation cooperative, shortline railway, that is Alberta's longest straight section of railway running southeast 84 km (52 miles) from Camrose to Alliance. The railway was purchased in 2010 by area producers and residents. Battle River Railway serves its agriculture and industrial customers on a weekly basis. Battle River Railway offers three core services: tourism, storage, and commodity transportation².



The primary trading area captures customers that would purchase a significant portion of their good/services from Camrose or visit on a regular basis. The secondary trading area would indicate that people get some or part of their goods/services from Camrose.

Demographics

Camrose was established as a popular retirement community with small town warmth and big city amenities but is now known as a top spot for young couples and families live. With the cost of housing below the provincial average, Camrose is an attractive balance between convenience and affordablity. The City has a robust health care system, great schools, and is known for the exceptional recreational facilities that host everything from local club practices and tournament play to world class, televised events.

While 23% of Camrose's 2022 population was over the age of 65, there are growing segments of people aged 30 to 40 and 4 to 14. These increases indicate that young people and families are moving to Camrose. Camrose's trimodal distribution is unique from other Albertan cities with the difference being the inflow of retirees.

Population Distribution by Age Groups in Camrose, 2022




Figure 3: Age of residents in Camrose¹

Municipal Census Population Estimates 2016 to 2024




Figure 4: Municipal census population estimates² and forecast from the 2023-2048 Growth Study³



The City of Camrose has a talented workforce. The extensive agricultural industry has created an environment where generational knowledge and skills are instilled in the upcoming workforce.


Skilled tradespeople have several options for continuing their apprenticeships at trades schools including NAIT (Edmonton), Red Deer Polytechnic, Lakeland College (Vermilion).

The University of Alberta hosts a liberal arts satellite campus in Camrose called Augustana. This university offers full undergraduate and graduate programs from computing science to ethics and global studies and everything in between. Graduate programs offered in Camrose include occupational therapy, physical therapy, and speech-language pathology.

This talent pipeline offers opportunities for companies searching for high-achieving individuals with academic and trades training to support businesses of all types.

Life in Camrose

The average price of a house in Camrose is \$251,720¹ which is less than the Alberta average home price at \$361,568.² Camrose has experienced an influx of people migrating from across Canada due to soaring housing prices in other regions. In 2023, there was higher demand for apartment/duplex units than previous years which indicates a need for more affordable housing options.³

Taxes and Incentives

Employee Compensation

Minimum wage: \$15/hour

Overtime: Employees are paid 1.5 times their regular wage after eight hours per day or 44 hours per week²

Benefits: Additional optional benefits paid by employers may include Group Insurance such as: Life, Dental, Health, Vision, Sickness, and Physical/Mental Fitness.

Municipal Tax

In Alberta, property taxes are assessed based on market value. There are three levies against assessable property: Municipal levy, Alberta Education levy, and the Camrose and Area Lodge Authority levy. Municipal tax rates vary within the region and are based on mill rates.

Personal Tax

Alberta's single-rate personal income is contributing to the positive migration of workers from across Canada to Alberta. Alberta also has the highest basic personal tax exemption in Canada (\$21,885³), the lowest fuel tax rates and no provincial sales tax, resulting in a low cost of living for residents.

Provincial Tax

Alberta doesn't have a provincial sales tax. Goods and services are subject to General Sales Tax (5%) which is collected by the Federal Government.

Major Industries

Regional Industries

In terms of merchandise exports, Alberta is known for energy products (mostly oil, natural gas, and refined petroleum). Energy products accounted for 75% of Alberta's total exports in 2023. The next highest exporting industry in Alberta was farm, fishing and intermediate food products; an industry that is closely tied to Camrose's economy. Camrose County has 625,481 acres of highly productive cropland. The City of Camrose is home to several agriculture manufacturing, equipment dealerships, and agriculture value-added facilities.

Industry Clusters in Camrose

Camrose's main industry clusters are oil and gas, value-added agriculture, and health care. The oil and gas manufactures include pipe manufacturing and pipe coating services. Value-added agriculture includes grain processing, agriculture manufacturing, and agriculture equipment sales. Health care and social assistance is the largest employing sector since Camrose is positioned as a regional health care hub.



Construction

Construction companies operating in Camrose are busy! There is steady demand for residential single family, duplex, and apartment complex housing starts.

On top of the residential building demand, commercial and industrial renovations, expansions, and new developments are exceeding expectations. Recent municipal investments in infrastructure includes a new Wastewater Treatment Plant (\$44.2 million), a major renovation project on the Mayer Aquatic Centre (\$17.2 million), and many road and utilities modernization projects.

Industry Spotlight

Camrose is integrally connected to the regional agriculture industry which is comprised of 4.7 million acres of farmland. There is a growing international market for value-added products with increased consumer demand for healthy, nutrient-rich, convenient products, combined with the global food demand expected to increase by 70% by 2050. Surrounded by rich cropland, Camrose already supports an emerging agrimanufacturing and agri-business industry with room for expansion and diversification. The agriculture community, generational knowledge of the agriculture industry, and well educated workforce make Camrose a prime location for value-added agriculture. The top crops produced in the Camrose region are Canola, Wheat, Barley, Peas, Alfalfa, and Oats.





The Camrose region has 968 farms and over 625,000 acres of cropland.

Camrose demonstrates leadership in the rural health care sector by hosting numerous pilot projects in the community including: COPD Home Health Monitoring program, Hospitalists Program, Stroke Intervention Program, Community Cancer Centre, Community Paramedic Program, and the Nav-CARE Program.

23% of Camrosians are 65 years old and above. Retirees are migrating to Camrose because of the quality and density of health care services available along with robust recreational and entertainment options.

The City of Camrose has over 3,000 students enrolled in K-12 studies. There are 11 schools located throughout the City, some offering French Immersion and other specialty programs.

There are over 1,000 students enrolled in post-secondary studies at the University of Alberta Augustana Campus and about 30 students attending the Canadian Lutheran Bible Institute (CLBI) campus.
